CHAIR'S REPORT

MARY GARDINER



As I write this report to you, our members and stakeholders, I paused to think about all that has been accomplished during the eight years since I joined the Board in December 2009.

Each year I have been more and more impressed and delighted with the achievements and outcomes of everyone involved in ANC and as you will read below, this year also included

some great accomplishments. The collective energy and passion of our players, coaches, umpires, managers, volunteers, sponsors, grant funders, staff and everyone who contributes to and experiences the ultimate experience is inspiring – thank you!

Events were a key focus of Auckland Netball during the year, in particular we were honoured to host the World Masters Games in April and in September the UNISS, Upper North Island Secondary Schools Tournament. Both events were superbly well organised by our experienced and enthusiastic team of staff leading a wonderful crew of volunteers. There were amazing performances and magical experiences every day of these events and we welcomed the opportunities to showcase our sport at Auckland Netball Centre.

Along with running great events and competitions Auckland Netball is focussed on building expertise and creating a legacy, sharing our experience with others. Our staff team would welcome opportunities to collaborate with others and share experience in the netball world around events, our performance and player welfare approach.

Facilities and future development were again a key focus for the Board during the year. There is little tangible progress to report on the Colin Maiden Park plan, however Auckland Netball is contributing to research being undertaken by Auckland Council and Aktive assessing indoor court space and needs throughout Auckland. We are positive the outcome of this work will be helpful and support the Colin Maiden plan including expansion of ANC. The timeframe is uncertain and the challenge will be for sports and recreational partners to make things happen given more traditional sources of funding may not be available.

On a very positive note we are delighted to report that great progress has been made on the upgrade of our Windmill Road facility. In a project generously funded by Auckland Council aimed at increasing sports facility capacity, Fulton Hogan, Hardwood Technology, Rankin and Fencrite are upgrading lighting, replacing fences and rubberising the Windmill Road courts. The upgrade is on track to be completed for the commencement of the summer season. The outcome will be more netball, tennis, futsal and a diverse range of community use.

A key challenge of the Board and management team has been our efforts to find a new naming rights sponsor for Auckland Netball Centre. The sponsorship environment remains extremely tough and competitive with many impressive and well-run organisations competing for limited grant funding and sponsorship support. We will

continue to engage the business community as we share the story of Auckland Netball Centre in order to find a suitable naming rights partner.

In the meantime I want to assure you that ANC is in a strong financial position and we are very pleased this year with the improved spread of revenue prior to depreciation result reported in the accompanying financial statements. This is in no small way an outcome of careful and prudent management by Dianne Lasenby, our CEO and her excellent team.

I reiterate the statement made previously about our financial position, ANC has a strong balance sheet, with well-maintained fixed assets and good cash reserves.

Just prior to Christmas we announced a new, innovative and collaborative arrangement with ANC CEO Dianne Lasenby being appointed General Manager to the Northern Stars. This is a shared management agreement between Auckland Netball and the Northern Stars in which Dianne, supported by members of the ANC team will work with the Stars this year. We are excited and confident this collaboration will see better engagement with members, fans and our community and we see great potential in this opportunity for Netball, beyond ANC.

I would like to acknowledge our family of funders and sponsors all of whom contribute not just as sponsors and grant funders, but with genuine enthusiasm for our game. We would not be able to offer the range of wonderful opportunities to our members and community without your generous support.

On behalf of the Board I would like to recognise the exceptional contribution of Dianne Lasenby, our Chief Executive and our wonderful ANC team for their sound and professional management of ANC. The team rise to the challenge each year to be innovative, bold, authentic and true to our values of passion, professionalism, accountability, innovation and diversity. Not every decision we take is popular but be assured that we are focussed on balancing the primary focus of netball with other sports and community groups to maximise opportunities for you all.

I would like to acknowledge the ANC Board team. We are very lucky to have such a skilled, diverse, knowledgeable and experienced team of volunteers. Every Board member contributed their skills outside of Board meetings to contribute more deeply to ANC and I appreciate their energy and generosity. In addition, we enjoy a strong and productive relationship with the Orakei Local Board and Albert Eden Local Board.

Congratulations to all the players and participants who gave their all during the year and Thank You! to the coaches, umpires, managers, administrators, officials, parents and visitors. We look forward to welcoming you as part of our sporting and recreational community at ANC next year.

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

DIANNE LASENBY



2017 was regarded as a very memorable year for Auckland Netball, one the organisation can be extremely proud of.

In April, Auckland Netball was part of the 9th World Masters Games that saw over 28,000 athletes from over 100 countries and 28 sports arrive in Auckland for 10 days. Auckland Netball was the chosen venue for netball with over 70 teams taking part. It was wonderful to be part of this historical

world event that will continue to be talked about by all those that were part of it for many years to come.

In September, we were fortunate to be able to follow up with another successful event, UNISS. Again, Auckland Netball and its team excelled themselves, providing an outstanding week-long tournament with record numbers of teams attending.

I was equally as proud to finally welcome 3 Kings Netball Association to Windmill Road to play under our Auckland Netball Centre umbrella on Saturday mornings. We were mindful that the important history this successful association has built over the years, was continued through to the new venue. I would like to thank Marianne Booth and Lenora Noble of 3 Kings Netball Association for their forward thinking, being brave and trusting in Auckland Netball to continue this legacy, and their help to ensure the transition went smoothly.

The Windmill Road netball courts upgrade was to have commenced in January 2017, however, at the last moment it struck a bit of a speedbump (one which was out of our hands), resulting in a delay preventing the upgrade from taking place at that time. This immediately affected some of the Windmill Road leagues and programmes that we had planned for. Once we were able to get past this unexpected hurdle, we were able to work closely with the team at Council to make sure the upgrade was rescheduled for a time that would cause the least interruption and impact to our competitions and programmes. It was agreed this would be after our winter season and would commence at the beginning of September and be finished by mid-February. The project included upgrades to fencing, lighting and rubberised courts. I would like to thank Hardwood Technology, Rankin and McManus and Fencerite for their patience during the delay, and subsequently the high standard of workmanship they have brought to the project.

Initially, only 7 of the courts were to be rubberised, but thanks to the Auckland Council project team, all 15 courts are now rubberised. Auckland Netball wishes to sincerely thank Auckland Council for their support and generous funding of this substantial project in its entirety and to Albert Eden Local Board for their unwavering support throughout the process.

In what was already a busy year, Kokkino Café Events and Catering continued to grow the function and event business held at Auckland Netball. Many large events held have included boxing nights, a fashion show, Christmas parties for over 300 people, children's birthday parties, and a diverse range of sporting events and community use.

Player welfare was prioritized at the top of our strategic goals for 2017. Our concerns had been discussed with key stakeholders for many years, however, it was now time for us to lead the way, be big and brave and put a stake in the ground.

We concentrated on two initiatives - the first being the implementation of a Player Welfare Liaison role that would provide support and advocate for athletes, to create sustainable positive and healthy netball lifestyle. The role would become a trusted and effective support person for selection of the representative players, aided in communication between the athlete and other parties, such as coaches medical staff, managers and family. A holistic approach would assist athletes in making realistic achievement goals both in and out of netball and educate athletes around training loads and levels of participation, with an understanding of the Netball NZ player development guidelines. We were delighted when Debbie Christian (nee White) agreed to take on this inaugural role.

We also launched an innovative development program designed for Year 7 players that was implemented in lieu of the traditional Year 7 representative teams. This new programme had a broader reach, catering for up to 45 athletes. Auckland Netball enlisted the services of Dr Craig Harrison, Director of Athlete Development at AUT Millennium, to put together the inaugural content. Our focus is to continue to ensure players are remaining in the game and playing netball at the highest level. This bodes well with research papers that show playing representative netball at such an early age may not be beneficial for the athlete.

I would like to thank Debbie Christian for leading both these new strategic objectives, being so passionate, and continuing to offer new ideas to further progress each of these initiatives in 2018.

Auckland Netball could not continue as we are today without the support of Auckland Council and Orakei Local Community Board, with an annual operating grant that is utilized towards maintaining our facilities to a high standard. We do have a comprehensive asset management plan that allows us to plan for upcoming replacement of assets, but undoubtedly there are always ones that need replacing or maintaining before their due date and others that we are able to get an extra couple of years out of. Last year we spoke of getting the first six of our rubberized courts re coated, unfortunately due to Hardwood's heavy work schedule, Windmill Road had to be a priority, so it was agreed that we will be undertaking these after the 2018 season and this will continue as a rolling programme over the next 4-5 years.

Also assisting us are the community grant funders, who continue to support us with contributions ranging from smaller assets, to salaries and some community programmes. Again, without their support we would not be able to focus on delivering these development programmes into the wider community.

We are grateful to our loyal family of sponsors who we enjoy working closely with throughout the year. We remind our members to please support these important groups whenever you can. Sharing a Facebook post only takes a second, but can be so beneficial for our sponsors. Thank you to those members that already do, and to others, we would love to seek your support as well. Thank you to Players Sports, Barfoot & Thompson, New World (Remuera, Stonefields and Eastridge), Konica Minolta/CSG, NumberWorks'nWords, d3 tape, SAS Sports Speedy Signs Penrose and Switch Utilities.

Because 2017 was such an eventful year, we were able to reflect a larger operating profit before depreciation than past years and this surplus will be a handy buffer if we continue to be unable to attract a naming right sponsor. We were mindful throughout the year to be cautious with our operating expenses. This year we have changed our depreciation method from diminishing to straight line. (see financial notes). Inclusive of depreciation of \$447,089 we incurred a total deficit of \$121,748. Depreciation will continue to remain high until we are able to generate sizable amounts of capital to assist covering the depreciation charge. Our statement of financial position again reinforces that we continue to be in a sound financial position.

It is my pleasure always to honour the great staff team I am proud to be a part of. Our successes would not have been possible without this professional group of people. My sincere thanks for all your efforts over the year. The delivery of such a diverse range of initiatives frequently stretches our resources within this small group, however the love of the game, your support of each other, and the willingness to ensure the ultimate experience for all always comes to the forefront.

This year we welcomed Tanya Hoyes into the role of Café Supervisor. Emma Dorsey was brought in as a temp to assist in the Games department, however, will now become a permanent member of the team from February 2018. And of course, Anne Nicholson who did such a wonderful job of convening the World Master's Games, has since moved into the Games department. For Anne it was like returning home to Auckland Netball. Each of these people provided us with an additional, wonderful skill set, enthusiasm, and new ideas that we could incorporate into day to day business.

In August, Liz Page our Netball Development Manager moved back into the Secondary School environment. We thank Liz for her passion in the performance area over the past 2 years. We are very excited to welcome back Leigh Ashton into the role from February 2018 as she and her family return back to Auckland. Leigh and Debbie Christian have already got some exciting plans in place for 2018.

To our loyal established team: Vickie, Desireah, Jacqui, Bernadette, Serena, Kendyl, Monika, Elaine and the facilities team of Grant and Mark. Thank you for your leadership, support and guidance, and your willingness to share your collective knowledge, all such an asset to the success of Auckland Netball.

I would like to recognise the Board for their significant contribution to our organisation and to progressing our key strategic objectives.

I must make mention of Mary Gardiner, Chair who spends an incredible number of hours outside of regular board meetings working with wider groups, encouraging all to take a wider and innovative view of how we administer our sport in a challenging environment. Mary is well supported by the other board members: Stephanie Bond, Adine Wilson, Anne Leijnen, Eric Hennephof, Tim Carter, Liz Kirschberg and Sheryl, Lady Wells. Each bring business acumen and expertise from their own professional roles and have an excellent understanding of the sporting landscape. I am fortunate to have been able to work with each when required for differing projects during the year. Finally, to Sheryl, Lady Wells, how fortunate we are to have a President who is held in such high esteem in all walks of life.

Thank you to all the players, coaches, umpires, managers, officials, volunteers, committee members, supporters, and facility users from across the greater Auckland area for your willingness to give up your time to see our sport remain the most popular women's sport in New Zealand.

This year I am embarking on a new venture as General Manager of the Northern Stars. I am very excited about this opportunity that the Board has granted me, and again, this is an example of their ability to look at an innovative and collaborative arrangement that allows me to split my time between this role and continue my role as CEO for Auckland Netball. In order to undertake both roles, there will be an increase in support and duties from Jacqui, Desireah, Vickie, and Bernadette.

2018 is certainly going to be an exciting, successful and enjoyable year.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1 Reporting Entity

The reporting entity is Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated. Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated is an Incorporated Society registered under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908 and has charitable status under the Charities Act 2005.

These financial statements and the accompanying notes summarise the financial results of activities carried out by Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated.

The primary activity of the centre is to deliver the ultimate experience through our multipurpose sporting, recreation and community hubs.

These financial statements have been approved and were authorised for issue by the Auckland Netball Incorporated Board on 19 February 2018.

2 Statement of Compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Tier 2 Public Benefit Entity (PBE) Financial Reporting Standards as issued by the New Zealand External Reporting Board (XBR). They comply with New Zealand equivalents to International Public-Sector Accounting Standards Reduced Disclosure Regime (NZ IPSAS with RDR) and other applicable Financial Reporting Standards as appropriate to Public Benefit Entities.

The Board has elected to report in accordance with Tier 2 PBE Accounting Standards on the basis that it does not have public accountability and annual expenditure does not exceed \$30 million, and has taken advantage of all applicable Reduced Disclosure Regime (RDR) disclosures.

3 The Centre's financial statements for the year ended 30 November 2016 were the first annual financial statements prepared in accordance with PBE IPSAS. The Centre applied PBE FRS 47 "First-time adoption of PBE Standards by entities other than those previously applying NZ IFRSs" in preparing those financial statements.

The Trust's transition date was 30 November 2016 and the adoption of PBE IPSAS did not result in any transition adjustments to the Statement of Financial Position at that date.

4 Summary of accounting policies

The significant accounting policies used in the preparation of these financial statements as set out below have been applied in these financial statements.

(a) Basis of Measurement

The financial statements have been prepared on a historical cost basis. The accrual basis of accounting has been used unless otherwise stated and the financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

(b) Presentational Currency

The financial statements are presented in New Zealand dollars.
All numbers are rounded to the nearest dollar.

(c) Revenue

Revenue is recognised to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefit or some potential benefit will flow to Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated and revenue can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment and excluding goods and services taxes or duties. The following specific recognition criteria must be met before revenue is recognised.

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Grant Revenue

Grant revenue includes grants given by trusts, central and local government organisations and is recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Revenue and Expenses when the conditions attached to the grant have been complied with. Where there are unfulfilled conditions attached to the grant, the amount relating to the unfulfilled condition is recognised as a liability and released to the Statement of Comprehensive Revenue and Expense as the revenue when the conditions are fulfilled.

Condition stipulation – funds received are required to be used for a specific purpose, with a requirement to return unused funds.

When non-exchange revenue is received with restrictions attached, but no requirement to return the asset if not deployed as specified, then revenue is recognised on receipt.

Restriction stipulation – funds received are required to be used for a specific purpose, with no requirement to return unused funds.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Interest

Interest income is recognised as it accrues, using the effective interest rate method.

Sale of goods

Revenue from sale of goods is recognised when Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated has transferred to the buyer the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the goods supplied. Significant risks and rewards are generally considered to be transferred to the buyer when the customer has taken undisputed delivery of the goods.

Rendering of services

Revenue from services rendered is recognised when the service takes place.

(d) Financial Instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument in another entity.

Financial instruments comprise trade debtor and other receivables, cash and cash equivalents, other financial assets, trade creditors and other payables, borrowings, and other financial liabilities.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

Initial recognition and measurement

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised initially at fair value plus transaction costs attributable to the acquisition, except for those carried at fair value through surplus or deficit, which are measured at fair value.

Derecognition of financial instruments

Financial assets are derecognised when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the financial asset expire, or if Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated transfers the financial asset to another party without retaining control or substantial all risks and rewards of the asset.

A financial liability is derecognised when it is extinguished, discharged, cancelled or expires.

Subsequent measurement of financial assets

The subsequent measurement of financial assets depends on their classification, which is primarily determined by the purpose for which the financial assets were acquired. The classification of financial assets is determined at initial recognition into one of four categories defined below, and re-evaluates this designation at each reporting date.

All financial assets except for those classified as fair value through profit or loss are subject to reviews for impairment at least at each reporting date. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied to each category of financial assets, which are described below.

Financial Assets

Financial assets within the scope of NFP PBE IPSAS 29 Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement are classified as financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, loans and receivables, held-to-maturity investments or available-for-sale financial assets. The classifications of the financial assets are determined at initial recognition.

Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated's financial assets are classified as either financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit, or receivables. Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated's financial assets include: cash and cash equivalents, short term investments and receivables from non-exchange transactions.

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit

Financial assets at fair value through surplus or deficit include items that are either classified as held for trading or that meet certain conditions and are designated at fair value through surplus or deficit upon initial recognition.

Receivables

Receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated's cash and cash equivalents, short-term investments, receivables from non-exchange transactions and receivables from exchange transactions fall into this category of financial instruments.

Impairment of non-derivative financial assets

At the end of the reporting date, Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and impairment losses are incurred if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (a "loss event") and that loss event has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or the group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, if there is objective evidence that an impairment loss on loans and receivables carried at amortised cost has been incurred, the amount of the loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. The amount of loss is recognised in the surplus or deficit for the reporting period.

In determining whether there is any objective evidence of impairment, the Centre first assesses whether there is objective evidence of impairment of financial assets that are individually significant, and individually or collectively significant for financial assets that are not individually significant. If the Centre determines that there is no objective evidence of impairment for an individually assessed financial asset, it includes the asset in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assesses them for impairment. Assets that are individually assessed for impairment and for which an impairment loss is or continues to be recognised are not included in a collective assessment for impairment.

Financial liabilities

Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated's financial liabilities include trade creditors (excluding GST and PAYE), employee entitlements, and income received in advance (in respect to grants whose conditions are yet to be complied with).

All financial liabilities are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction cost for financial liabilities not at fair value through surplus or deficit) and are measured subsequently at amortised cost using the effective interest method except for financial liabilities at fair value through surplus or deficit.

- (e) **Cash and cash equivalents**
Cash and cash equivalents are short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.
- (f) **Debtors and other receivables**
Trade debtors and other receivables are measured at their cost less any impairment losses. An allowance for impairment is established where there is objective evidence Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivable.
- (g) **Creditors and other payables**
Trade creditors and other payables are stated at cost.
- (h) **Inventories**
Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value, with due allowance for any damaged and obsolete stock items.

If inventories are acquired at no cost, or for nominal consideration, cost is the estimated fair value at the date of acquisition, with a corresponding donation amount recognised in the reported surplus or deficit.

Cost is calculated on an average basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring inventories and bringing them to a location and condition available for sale.

Net realisable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of the business, less estimated cost of completion and the estimated costs necessary to make the sale, exchange or distribution.
- (i) **Property, plant and equipment**
Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the asset. Where an asset is acquired through a non-exchange transaction, its cost is measured at its fair value as at the date of acquisition.

Depreciation methods, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each reporting date and are adjusted if there is a change in the expected pattern of consumption of the future economic benefits or service potential embodied in the asset. As a result of this year's annual review, management has elected to depreciate all assets on a straight-line basis, and amended certain rates where relevant, to better reflect the useful lives and anticipated usage of all assets.

Depreciation rates have been updated as follows

•	Buildings & Courts	13 – 50 years	SL
•	Plant and Equipment	7 – 33 years	SL
•	Furniture and Fixtures	7 – 33 years	SL

Disposals

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits or service potential are expected from its use or disposal.

When an item of property, plant or equipment is disposed of, the gain or loss recognised in the surplus or deficit is calculated as the difference between the net sale proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset.

- (j) **Leases**
Payments on operating lease agreements, where the lessor retains substantially the risk and rewards of ownership of an asset, are recognised as an expense on a straight-line basis over the lease term.
- (k) **Employee benefits**
Liabilities for salaries and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.
- (l) **Income tax**
Due to its charitable status (Charities Services number CC36706) Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated is exempt from income tax.
- (m) **Goods and services tax (GST)**
All amounts in these financial statements are shown exclusive of GST, except for receivables and payables that are stated inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the Inland Revenue Department (IRD) is included as part of receivables or payables in the Statement of Financial Position.

- 5 **Significant accounting, judgements, estimates and assumptions**
The preparation of Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

Estimates and assumptions
Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

Useful lives and residual values
The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to determine potential future use and value from disposal:

- The condition of the asset
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed
- Availability of funding to replace the asset
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset

The estimated useful lives of the asset classes held by Auckland Netball Centre Incorporated are listed in note 4(i).

WORLD MASTERS GAMES

ANNE NICHOLSON | GAME LIAISON

The World Masters Games 2017 were declared “the best Games ever” by Kai Holm, President of the International Masters Games Association at the Closing Ceremony, and Auckland Netball was part of this phenomenal experience.

The World Masters Games is the largest multi-sport event in the world. It seeks to promote lifelong competition, friendship and understanding between mature sportspeople, regardless of age, gender, race, religion, or sports status. Held every four years, Auckland hosted the 9th edition of the World Masters Games 21 – 30 April 2017.

The Games was the largest event delivered in New Zealand since the Rugby World Cup in 2011; 28,578 participants attended, aged between 25 to 101 years (average age 54 years), and from 106 countries. Participants typically have three primary motivations; a lifelong passion for sport; enjoyment of the social activity around sport and a desire for travel and culture.

Netball NZ’s bid as a non-core sport was successful. Netball was one of 28 sports played, with Auckland Netball Centre being one of the 48 competition venues.

- 73 teams entered from 5 countries (New Zealand, Australia, United Kingdom, Sri Lanka and South Africa)
- 750 participants (38% international, 62% domestic)
- 18 divisions and age categories
- 304 games played over 6 days
- 98 Sport Volunteers accredited by WMG; 62 as Umpires and Bench Officials
- 602 medals awarded

The planning and logistics were huge, the thorough WMG accreditation process for participants and volunteers was a totally new process for many of us and thankfully the autumn weather was magnificent.

Our competition opened with Beverly Douglas, President of Netball NZ, reading a tribute to Tania Dalton, former Silver Fern, who had registered to play Netball but tragically died a couple of months earlier. The Centre was packed with Tania’s family and friends, players and supporters when a minute of silence was observed. Her team “T-bags” (Tania’s nickname), played the first game and during the week raised awareness of the Tania Dalton Foundation that had been set up to support sports training and development for underprivileged children.



Another poignant moment was that on the eve of ANZAC Day, by chance, our New Zealand Defence Force Masters team was drawn to play the Royal Air Force Masters team. The comradeship was strong and the emotional significance of this game was very evident.

There were many of our Auckland Netball members participating in the Games as players, non-playing team officials, supporters, volunteers, umpires or bench officials.

We appreciated the experience of Lyn Pellow to produce a draw for this complex competition. Thank you to Jan Skilton, Megan Lockwood and Ange Newton for managing the recruitment and allocations of umpires and bench officials, respectively. It was also pleasing to see so many faces from other netball centres who were for once playing the game that they dedicate most of their time and energy to organizing, or supporting others to play on a weekly basis in their own localities.



Our medical services Event Care and PhysioOne along with the New Zealand College of Massage students, were in great demand as the days progressed. However, who could ever forget the impact the ice baths (large inflatable pools) would have on the players. It was where recovery took place, games were reflected on, jokes were told, songs were sung, nightly social arrangements were confirmed, flying plastic bath ducks got shot by water guns and new friendships were made.

Our team of enthusiastic volunteers made this the place to be.



The green uniformed volunteers were easy to find and incredibly helpful. They came from all over New Zealand and even Australia wanting to positively contribute to the players experience (including Life Members, Service Award recipients and former Board members of Auckland Netball). The scene was set from the HQ Control Room team lead by Sheryl, Lady Wells, Bev Douglas and Liz Hickey (ex Auckland Netball Board Member) with the daily antics including the reoccurring kidnapping of a stuffed bird, random spot prizes and awards, and leading the Wear a Silly Hat Day. A few of our new friends have continued to support our Centre, assisting with other large events throughout the year and weekly on game nights as Junior Co-ordinators.



All games were played in great spirit, especially when some age categories and divisions were combined for competition purposes, mixing past and present elite players with keen amateurs in some games. Despite this, medals were awarded based on the results from the original category entered. The medal ceremonies were a time of great celebration and achievement and at times resembled a parade of returning war veterans. Unfortunately, many players needed to be supported by various forms of medical appliances and/or equipment as they proudly received their medals.

Netball and Auckland Netball Centre received great coverage leading up to and during the Games. WMG2017 Ambassadors included former Silver Ferns and WMG participants Anna Stanley and Jenny-May Coffin and of course the support for the T-bags team with the Tania Dalton Foundation. To boost participation for Netball and the Games, Lady Raewyn Henry kindly featured in a Woman's Weekly article.

Auckland Netball Centre was also chosen as a competition venue as part of the tour for the Observer Programme. This programme is an opportunity for the event sector and other stake holders, such as sports organisations, within New Zealand and internationally, to increase their knowledge and understanding of major events.

Auckland Netball thoroughly enjoyed working with Kate Agnew and Emma Fowlie from Netball NZ and Brittney Scott from WMG. Our vision – To deliver the “ultimate experience” through our multipurpose sporting, recreation and community hub-was alive and evident to the participants and visitors. It was a pleasure to see Netball for Life in action here with our mature players and we plan to continue to provide this opportunity with an annual Over 35's tournament. The memories and photos will remain with all involved. The large steel WMG Netball figurine that was displayed at the Entertainment Hub on Queens Wharf during the Games will soon be permanently placed at Auckland Netball as a reminder of this historical event that Auckland Netball was part of.

SOCIAL MEDIA REPORT

BERNADETTE MACHELL | MARKETING MANAGER

This year we had a continued strategic goal of growing our social media audience, presence and overall use by 15%.

Social media, and Facebook in particular for Auckland Netball, provides a cost-effective way to engage with our members and reach a wider audience, with the ability to target audiences based on specific characteristics/ location. There are also some fairly useful tools to analyse our reach and impact.

Facebook allows you to export and analyse data in 6 monthly blocks so the following analysis is based on the timeframes December 1, 2016 - May 31 2017 (period 1) & June 1, 2017 - October 31, 2017 (period 2).

OUR FOLLOWERS

Over the past 12 months we have gained 1,012 new followers which is a 19% increase from what it was on 1 December 2016.

The increase over the past 12 months was 36% higher than the previous 12-month period which is a testament to the focus we have put on Facebook this year.

If you look at the year in two blocks there was an 8.2% increase in followers from period 1 to period 2.

OUR ENGAGEMENT

In period 1 we had an average of 303 individuals engaging with our page and content per day and this increased in period 2 with an average of 475 unique individuals engaging daily.

This is an increase of 56.7% from period 1 to period 2. A general theme being that we have increased engagement throughout the season.

Overall, we saw a 52% average increase of engagement this year compared to last year.

HOW MANY PEOPLE ARE WE REACHING?

We have found our 'Reach' which is the total number of people that see our posts (this includes followers, their friends and family and wider audience) has increased dramatically.

In the 12-month period from December 1, 2016 we reached 1,620,572 unique individuals, which is a 111% increase from the previous 12-month period.

When looking at the two different periods, we saw a 19.3% increase from period 1 to period 2.

Broken down, the average daily reach increased from 4,060 individuals in period 1 to 4,844 individuals in period 2.

SUCCESSSES

Some of our most successful posts/campaigns this year were:

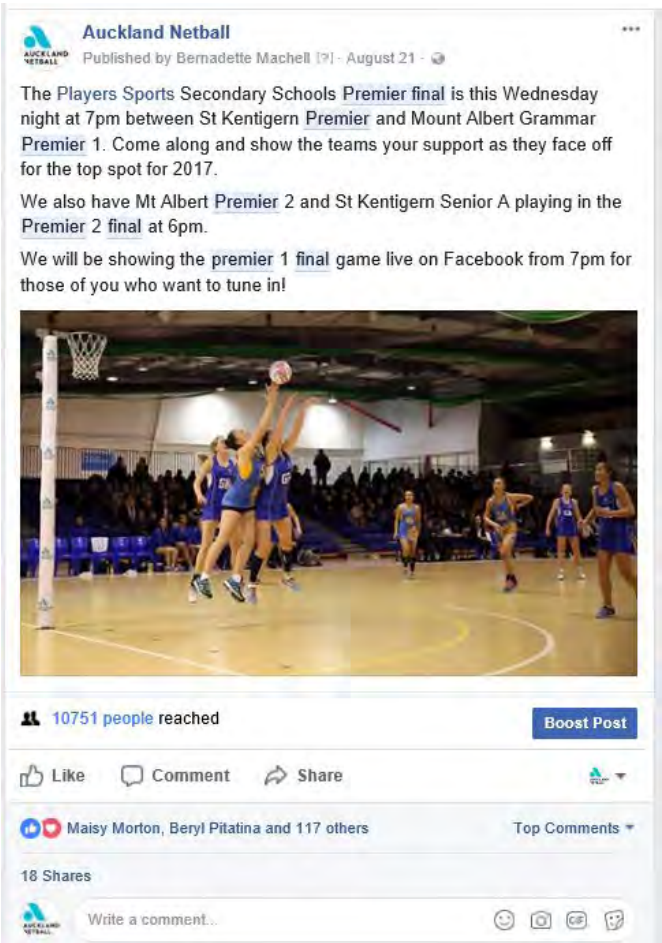
1. We have continued to use sports photographer Michael Bradley to photograph various events/tournaments over the past year and we have been posting photos which have been receiving a lot of interest, interactions, likes and comments.

The photos are of a very high standard so they grab follower's attention. He often posts pictures when on-site at Auckland Netball, thus giving us further exposure as they reach his audience.

2. Another very successful addition to our Facebook platform was the introduction of live-streamed matches; on a very small scale.

We only posted 4 live streamed matches, and the success of those videos was very large.

The viewership ranged from 1.7k to over 3.5k, with an average of over 2.5k viewers per video. This is an area which we will be building on for 2018.

AFTERSCHOOL PROGRAMMES

Our Afterschool Coaching Clinics have continued to run throughout 2017. A 6-week skills-and game-based netball programme ran at both the St Johns (ANC) and Mt Eden (Windmill Rd/Kohia Terrace School) venues this year.

This programme was designed to give children the opportunity to increase their netball skills with a weekly focus on developing individual skills and abilities as well as working together with others to develop game play.

These sessions covered basic skills, fitness and consolidation games in a fun and energetic environment with experienced coaches.

TEAM COACHING

A new initiative was offering team coaching. This involved working with teams over 4 sessions to help them improve in certain areas and get them ready for the season. Teams and coaches were able to choose what areas of their game they wanted to work on and we would tailor sessions to suit.

HOLIDAY PROGRAMMES

This year we have continued to see great success in our holiday programmes, with numbers continually growing throughout the year, especially in our Netball and Multi-Activity programmes.

Netball – Our Netball holiday programme ran for children from Years 1-8. Due to the World Masters Games and the upgrade of the courts we ran our Windmill Road programme at Epsom Girls Grammar this year. We had great feedback about the venue and saw great growth in the number of participants that attended.

Our Netball Holiday programme aims to teach and further develop a wide range of netball skills, where children can gain confidence in a high energy, action packed environment. Running the programme are qualified and experienced coaches who are often our current representative players.

Netball Intensive Programme – Our Netball Intensive programme has continued to be a popular holiday programme and has proven popular with intermediate children looking to grow and extend their skills. This programme is focused on drills and games and is designed to help players take their game to the next level in a more intense environment.

Multi-Activity Mania – Our Multi-Activity programme runs for boys and girls in Years 1-8. Each holidays children get to complete new and exciting activities, making sure they have lots of fun and are getting to try new things.

Children have been whipping up batches of cupcakes, getting creative with crafts, showing off their artistic flair, learning and improving sports skills, seeing science reactions take place, solving puzzles and working together in team games, all while making new friends! With our fun and enthusiastic coaches, this programme has proven to be very popular with children and parents alike.

All Sorts of Sports – Our All Sorts of Sports programme ran in January this year. All Sorts of Sports is a Multi-Sport programme which gives children the opportunity to learn and play a range of sports in a fun environment. Some of the sports we have included in our programme are football, basketball, netball, tennis, hockey and athletics.

We were unable to run the programme in April due to the World Masters Games so we incorporated it into our Multi-Activity programme which we found so successful, we continued this for the rest of the year.

Kokkino Kids Cooking – This year our Kokkino Kids Cooking programme was so popular that all the classes were filled up during the school holidays. Children have had the opportunity to create their own flavours of dishes, whether they were cooking roasts, savouries, quiches, kebabs, pizzas or baking delicious treats.

Dance – We introduced a Dance programme in the October Holidays at Diocesan School for Girls. We had a professional dance teacher come in and teach a range of different styles including contemporary dance, hip-hop, ballet, jazz and theatre. At the end of each programme, the children gave a performance of the routine they had learnt to their parents.

COMMUNITY SPONSORSHIP INITIATIVE

Our community sponsorship initiative has been running for two years. We value the support we have received from our members, local businesses and the wider community, in working alongside Auckland Netball to donate \$100 towards a child attending one of our netball programmes. It is a great opportunity to make a difference in a child's life in our community.

NET BEAT

This year Auckland Netball introduced a 6 week pre-season fitness training programme for Years 5-8, which focused on getting participants fit for the netball season. The training programme was held over six weeks from Monday 20 February through to Monday 27 March with a total of 15 participants.

GET READY FOR NETBALL CAMP

This year we ran a “Get Ready for Netball” Camp for Seniors (Years 9-13) and Juniors (Years 5-8) with 28 participants to prepare players for their school and club trials.

PRE-TRIALS SKILLS SESSION

Auckland Netball ran the session prior to the representative trials, which was offered to all Year 7-9 nominated players.

There were 30 players who took up the opportunity to receive coaching tips from our representative coaches and experience some game-play leading into the trials.

OFF SEASON DEVELOPMENT CAMPS

As part of our development programme Auckland Netball introduced an Off Season Development Camp which was aimed at advanced level players. It was run over a series of 3 camp days: 10 October 2017, 26 November 2017 and 11 February 2018.

There were 27 participants from the Year 5-11 age-group who attended the 3 day camps, where they took part in fitness, skills sessions and game play. The camps were run by Auckland Netball Representative Coaches.

COACHING IN SCHOOLS

Coaching in Schools was again a popular option for schools looking for some additional support for teams who took part in our weekly competitions. The schools that participated in the Coaching in Schools programme in 2017 were:

SPECIALIST COACHING CLINIC

Due to the success of the coaching clinic last year Auckland Netball ran a Specialist Coaching Clinic over Queens Birthday weekend. The clinic focused on learning position-specific skills and their application in game play. Along with a group of experienced coaches we were excited to have SKYCITY Mystics players Elisapeta Toeava, Tera-Maria Amani, Sasha Corbin & Mererangi Paul as guest coaches at the clinic, which involved a total of 102 participants.

KIWISPORT | ONEHUNGA HIGH SCHOOL

Auckland Netball has supported Onehunga High School with the delivery of a quality netball programme.

The KiwiSport funding granted by Sport NZ via Sport Auckland has assisted the school in supporting players, coaches and administrators within the school's sports programme.

KIWISPORT | TARGETED IN-SCHOOL COACHING

Auckland Netball worked alongside Sport Auckland's school clusters to deliver netball during Terms 1, 2 & 3.

A total of 1,346 Year 1-8 students took part in 4-8 in school coaching sessions.

A group of experienced coaches led the in-school sessions based on the new Netball NZ futureFerns programme content.

We delivered into the following schools with the help of the KiwiSport funding:

KIWISPORT | SECONDARY SCHOOL OFFICIALS PROGRAMME

This year Sport Auckland assisted us to deliver Coach, Umpire, Manager and Administrator workshops to the secondary schools that currently play in our weekly competition. These workshops were focussed on the development of identified areas specific to secondary schools.

UMPIRING IN SCHOOLS

The programme consists of one theory session where students gained their Auckland Netball Centre Theory Badge (first step to umpiring), which enables them to take the court.

Following the theory, a two-hour practical session taken by an umpire coach is offered, which is beneficial in giving participants the added confidence of umpiring their first game in a relaxed environment.

As a direct result of these classes we had 396 Centre Theory passes.

We had a total of 8 Secondary Schools who participated in this initiative. The following schools took part:

BECOME AN UMPIRE CLINIC

The interactive three-hour "Become an Umpire" class was held most months at Auckland Netball and is appropriate for school Year 7 students and above.

A total of 12 classes were delivered with 225 participants attending and passing their Centre Theory paper.

These classes were facilitated by Avary Patutama and Cory Nicholls.

YEAR 7 DEVELOPMENT SQUAD

DEBBIE CHRISTIAN | PLAYER WELFARE LIAISON



Auckland Netball's innovative thinking and extensive analysis of past players lead to the decision to replace Year 7 Representative teams with a new and exciting development programme for 2017.

Netball NZ along with several key research papers state, that year 7 is too early for children to specialise in one chosen sport and that "talent" identification in this age group is not accurate nor an indicator for further higher sporting representations. Replacing the year 7 representative teams with a development programme has allowed for a wider group of players to receive specialist coaching on a regular basis.

The programme began with 2 sessions of trials which was helpful to gauge the ability level of players so the programme could be adjusted to suit. There were 42 enrolled participants who were split into even ability groups. Each group had a specific coach whom they worked with every week. Having small groups was extremely beneficial for the players, who were able to receive individualised and specific feedback. The weekly focus was on a specific skill, game tactic and physical area of strength. This information was emailed to parents in advance so they were informed and connected to the programme.

These key focus points were repeated to the players at the start, during and end of the session so they had a clear understanding of what we were trying to achieve. The key skills, physical conditioning and tactics were facilitated through a variety of games and sporting situations to maximise enjoyment and learning.

The programme consisted of 7x 1.5 hour coaching sessions, a group trip the Sky City Mystics vs Stars ANZ game at ASB Stadium and a festival tournament where players were selected into equal ability teams to play a round robin tournament. Each player received an Auckland Netball singlet, a group photo at the end of the season and chocolate recovery milk at the conclusion of every coaching session.

Opportunities for parents to be involved included open coaching sessions so they could see what and how their daughter was learning, weekly email communications, copies of the strength exercises and a parents seminar delivered by Dr Craig Harrison. This seminar was designed to educate the parents on our philosophy of why "talent" identification at this age group was ineffectual, and the reasoning behind using multi sports as a vehicle to coach specific netball skills. We also included a parents competition during the festival tournament which was very well received.

Many thanks to the expert help and knowledge from Dr Craig Harrison and the sponsorship from James Christian, Anchor Dairy on Demand who kindly donated the chocolate recovery milk.

PLAYER WELFARE

DEBBIE CHRISTIAN | PLAYER WELFARE LIAISON

Auckland Netball has been a leader in the field of athlete wellbeing by instating the new role of Player Welfare Advisor for 2017. The philosophy behind this position is to provide support and advocate for athletes to create a sustainable, positive and healthy netball lifestyle, maximising potential and minimising risk to the individual.

The aims created at the beginning of the season were to:

- Become a trusted and effective support person for individual athletes
- Aid in communication between the athlete and other parties, such as coaches, medical staff, managers, family etc
- Assist athletes in making realistic achievement goals both in and out of netball
- Educate athletes around training loads and levels of participation

Players identified to be included in the programme for 2017 were:

- New Zealand secondary school squad members (8)
- Auckland U17 Representatives (12)
- Auckland U15 Representatives (12)

In addition:

- Auckland U19 representatives (5) who were selected later in the year as part of the NZSS team or had personally asked for advice
- U17 2's as a group from coach request

The programme plan was to set one on one interviews with each identified player to develop a relationship with these athletes, map out the season and address any issues or concerns, specifically looking at the number of teams and Wconditioning loading each girl was involved with. After each meeting, players received a follow up email, summarising what was covered and listing actions to be taken. These interviews were highly successful, with the majority of players requesting fortnightly meetings and a large amount of very positive parent feedback post interview.

Common topics raised in the interviews were:

- Overloading (both playing hours and conditioning)
- Lack of time to complete school work
- Pressure from coaches and at times parents
- Performance anxiety
- Lack of organisation and forward planning
- Injury management
- Unrealistic expectations from self
- Setting personal goals

During the season I consulted with Sharon Kerney, the Netball NZ injury prevention specialist, on appropriate loading and conditioning for adolescent players which was incredibly appreciated. Another tool used to help and advise athletes was the Netball NZ player development guidelines, a copy of this document was given to every player during the initial interview. Through out the season I communicated regularly with the NZ Secondary School Coach and Physio which was again very valuable and I felt was a positive link for many of the squad members.

The role of Player Welfare developed throughout the season in terms of advocacy with a considerable amount of time spent communicating with coaches, managers and parents. A coaches collaboration meeting was held during Term 2 with the aim of bringing premier secondary school coaches together to discuss the issues they were facing and collaborate on possible solutions. This was highly successful and something which I would like to expand on for 2018.

Advocacy was also achieved by the many proposals presented to the Northern Zone Performance Manager. Several key issues identified in the coaches collaboration meeting were raised and possible solutions offered. The key topic being the involvement of secondary school players in the Beko competition. All premier coaches bar one felt that this was having a detrimental effect on the individuals selected both in terms of athletic performance and attendance and achievement with their education.

Many thanks to Sharon Kerney for the expert advice and Mary-Jane Araroa (NZSS Coach) for her openness and communication.

SHIRLEY DAVIS | AUCKLAND NETBALL LIFE MEMBER - 19 NOVEMBER 1936 - 19 SEPTEMBER 2017

This year Auckland Netball lost a very special lady, Shirley Davis. Shirley was a valued Life Member of Auckland Netball and also held many volunteer roles within the netball fraternity.

Shirley assisted with our Auckland Netball Representative tournaments, making her famous club sandwiches for all the coaches, managers and team officials.

Shirley will be missed by all the team here at Auckland Netball and the greater netball community.

Memories of Shirley Davis lovingly known as 'Aunty Shirley' shared by Sheryl, Lady Wells, President Auckland Netball Centre.

'Aunty Shirley' arrived at our courts in the 70s and soon became the much loved Aunty to hundreds and respected setter of 'standards' on and off the court. In Aunty Shirley's teams, socks were pulled up neatly, your uniform worn in the proper manner and your hair tidy.

Her catering skills were legendary and another of her specialties. At special afternoon teas for visiting dignitaries, the Royal Doulton China would be taken from its hiding place behind the Crown Lynn, adding to the exceedingly high standard of sandwiches cut precisely to the same size with not a skerrick of crust to be seen. They almost looked too good to eat. After a lot of training, we younger ones with much scrutiny passed the preparation test.

One of her special moments was the visit of Prince Edward.

She loved all of our children and although there were many, she knew all their names. On arrival on a Saturday Aunty Shirley would be the first person they visited at the courts. In those days sugar wasn't a no no.

All children were trained to barrack for her team, Tamaki Makaurā, especially against their mother's teams! She was the manager and Doug Pai the coach. Shirley always had trouble reigning him in when he became too flamboyant either on the sideline or in the stands where we would all sit when she had a spare minute.

Shirley was always available and capable, and even in her later years, added value and contributed much to the sport and to peoples lives. Add to that a genuine interest in their families latest happenings.

During the recent World Masters Games Aunty Shirley with her usual high standards, was again running the catering for Umpires and Management. Age had not wearied her.

Aunty Shirley's age was always a complete mystery to us, she had been around for an absolute eternity and seemed ageless in looks, still capable and still exacting in presentation. But all good things come to an end, so it is with much sadness I write in her memory.

Her commitment to Netball saw her receive a Netball NZ Service Award in 1999 and in 2007 was honoured with Life Membership of Auckland Netball.

We have lost a great identity and stalwart of our centre, a cornerstone, whose unselfish contribution gave enjoyment to many.

Aunty Shirley will be sorely missed.
